Health Policy Fellows 2025–2026

BACKGROUND

At the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation (RWJF), we take bold leaps to transform health in our lifetime and pave the way, together, to a future where health is no longer a privilege, but a right. We fund diverse leaders who draw upon both innovative and time-tested strategies to create lasting change.

The RWJF Health Policy Fellows program supports RWJF's vision by creating a strong and diverse leadership in health policy committed to advancing health. This is a nonpartisan fellowship program located in Washington, D.C., that engages midcareer professionals interested in increasing their expertise in health policy.

Initiated in 1973, the RWJF Health Policy Fellows program seeks outstanding midcareer health professionals, behavioral and social scientists, and others with an interest in health and the drivers of health who (1) possess the skills and commitment to use the fellowship experience to provide leadership in improving health and the drivers of health through policy change at the national, state, or local level; (2) bring a depth of expertise and knowledge about health, health equity, and the drivers of health to the policymaking process; and (3) can offer an informed perspective on important and complex challenges facing policymakers.

Fellows actively participate in the formulation of national health policies in congressional or executive branch offices of their choosing and accelerate their careers as leaders in health policy. The National Academy of Medicine (NAM) conducts and administers the fellowship, with funding support from RWJF.

THE PROGRAM

The RWJF Health Policy Fellows program provides the nation's most comprehensive learning experience at the nexus of health, science, and policy in Washington, D.C. Fellows participate in the policy process at the federal level and leverage that leadership experience to promote policies, practices, and systems changes that advance the health of the nation.

The fellowship requires a full-time commitment with a minimum 12-month residence in Washington, D.C., which prepares individuals to influence the future of health and its drivers in the nation.

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The fellowship begins in September with an intensive three-and-a-half-month orientation arranged by the NAM, during which time, the fellows meet with national leaders well-versed in health, healthcare policy, health equity, social determinants of health, and structural racism; think tanks and interest groups; key executive branch officials; and members of Congress and their staff. Fellows also participate in seminars on health economics; the congressional budget process; current priority issues in federal health policy; and the process for federal decision-making. The concentrated orientation is designed to prepare the fellows for immediate success in federal legislative and executive branch positions.

The NAM will assist all fellows in setting up placement interviews. Each fellow is, however, solely responsible for selecting and securing their own placement in a federal government office in Washington, D.C., no later than January 15, 2026.

Fellowship placements generally begin no later than January 31. During these assignments, fellows are full-time, contributing participants in the policy process with members of Congress, a congressional committee, or in the executive branch. Solely under the supervision of the office in which they are placed, fellows typically will:

- Help develop legislative or regulatory proposals;
- Organize hearings, briefings, and stakeholder meetings;
- Meet with constituents; and
- Brief legislators or senior administration officials on a range of health issues.

Fellowship assignments are supplemented throughout the year by nonpartisan seminars and group discussions on contemporary federal policy topics, as well as media/strategic communications training and leadership development activities. Fellows prepare a formal presentation on a health policy issue with which they have been engaged. Fellows also take part in meetings with the NAM and other health policy organizations throughout the year.

Fellows may request approval from the national program office (NPO) at the NAM to extend the Washington, D.C., stay past the 12-month residential period of September 1, 2025 to August 31, 2026, until December 31, 2026, when the legislative session ends.

After the Washington, D.C., residential experience, fellows become part of a nationwide alumni network and typically return to Washington, D.C., each year to attend an Alumni Retreat and the NAM Annual Meeting, and to be briefed on issues and trends in health and healthcare policy.

FUNDING DETAILS

 Housing/Relocation: Fellows will be directly reimbursed for relocation and approved housing expenses through separate funds within limits specified by the NAM and RWJF.

ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA

- Eligible applicants are exceptional midcareer professionals from academic institutions, notfor-profit organizations, or government (including military; U.S. Dept. of Veterans Affairs; U.S. Public Health Service Commissioned Corps; and state offices who are not considered government officials under Section 4946 of the Internal Revenue Code);¹
- Applicants must have earned an advanced degree (masters or doctoral degree);
- In addition, applicants must have deep experience and subject matter expertise in a
 discipline that affects health. Examples include but are not limited to medicine; nursing;
 public health; law; dentistry; economics and other social sciences (especially disciplines
 related to factors that influence population health, such as housing, transportation, nutrition,
 wealth, employment, education, and environmental and community conditions); health
 services and social work/behavioral health; and other health professions;
- Applicants whose official job description or responsibilities are primarily government relations or advocacy are not eligible;
- Individual candidates for receipt of award funds must be U.S. citizens or permanent residents at the time of application. Because the RWJF Health Policy Fellows are placed in assignments in the federal government, changes in federal policy or law may necessitate

¹ Federal, state, tribal, and local government employees are eligible to apply unless they are considered government officials under Section 4946 of the Internal Revenue Code. The following text should appear in a footnote in the CFP: "For these purposes, a government official is defined as any person who holds one of the following:

a. An elective public office in the executive or legislative branch of the Government of the United States.

b. An office in the executive or judicial branch of the Government of the United States, appointment to which was made by the President.

c. A position in the executive, legislative, or judicial branch of the Government of the United States—(A) which is listed in schedule C of rule VI of the Civil Service Rules; or (B) the compensation for which is equal to or greater than the lowest rate of basic pay for the Senior Executive Service under section 5382 of title 5, United States Code.

d. A position under the House of Representatives or the Senate of the United States held by an individual receiving gross compensation at an annual rate of \$15,000 or more.

e. An elective or appointive public office in the executive, legislative, or judicial branch of the government of a State, tribe, possession of the United States, or political subdivision or other area of any of the foregoing, or of the District of Columbia, held by an individual receiving gross compensation at an annual rate of \$20,000 or more, and a significant part of whose activities include "the independent performance of policymaking functions.

f. A position as personal or executive assistant or secretary to any of the foregoing or

g. A member of the Internal Revenue Service Oversight Board."

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that RWJF consider adjustments in eligibility and grant terms, as well as placements in the program;

 Additionally, individual candidates for receipt of award funds cannot be related by blood or marriage to any Officer or Trustee of the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, or be a descendant of its founder, Robert Wood Johnson.²

SELECTION CRITERIA

Members of the RWJF Health Policy Fellows advisory board will assess each applicant, based on the following criteria:

- Professional achievements;
- Potential for leadership in health policy;
- Potential for future growth and career advancement;
- Potential for significant contributions to advancing health and health equity in the nation;
- Interpersonal and communications skills;
- Individual plans for incorporating the fellowship experience into specific career goals.

By mid-January 2025, the advisory board will select finalists from the applicants for in-person interviews in Washington, D.C., which will be held in mid- to late February 2025. Applicants who are selected for interviews will receive details about the remainder of the process upon invitation.

THE IDEAL CANDIDATE

Ideal candidates for this fellowship have a record of exceptional professional accomplishment and are recognized experts within their profession, community, institution, and/or organization. The fellowship strongly encourages individuals with diverse backgrounds, ideologies, and perspectives to apply. Candidates who come from professional backgrounds and disciplines that have not historically been represented in the RWJF Health Policy Fellows program are encouraged to apply, highlighting how their subject matter expertise and career trajectory support the goals of the program.

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Because of the unique nature of working on Capitol Hill or in the executive branch of the federal government and the uncertainty that often accompanies the political process, individuals who are flexible, team players, and fast learners tend to be more successful. A positive attitude, confidence, sense of humor, humility, critical thinking, listening skills, discretion, and patience are highly regarded. Those with strong emotional intelligence and networking skills will be able to maximize the value of this experience during the fellowship and in their subsequent roles as leaders and influencers committed to building a healthier and more equitable future for the nation.

MIDCAREER

Since we know that lives and careers follow many paths, we do NOT define "midcareer" in terms of age or years of experience. Typically, our fellows have at least the equivalent of 10–15 years of full-time practice or work experience (beyond training or residency) and are committed to contributing to the health policy field for at least 10 years after the fellowship. Successful applicants to this program have gained deep subject matter expertise in an area of health or the drivers of health and have a demonstrated track record of leadership activities and distinguished professional accomplishments. It is often helpful to refer to the biographies of current fellows to see examples of the level of professional achievement of successful applicants.

CONFLICT OF INTEREST

The NPO will request information from finalists about ongoing personal and professional activities or interests that might conflict with the participation of a fellow in congressional or federal assignments. This disclosure is required to identify any activity or interest that might represent a real or apparent conflict, including:

- 1. May significantly impair the fellow's objectivity, or
- 2. May create an unfair competitive advantage for any person or organization.

Each finalist will provide a list of past, existing, and future paid and unpaid activities, board affiliations, consultancies, or other interests and sources of financial support. To preserve the integrity of the fellowship program and to ensure that the fellow—during tenure as an RWJF Health Policy Fellow—is not compromised by the appearance of a conflict of interest, fellows will sign a statement affirming that there are no conflicts of interest or competing interests that would preclude them from accepting a congressional or executive branch placement during the fellowship year.

The term "conflict of interest" applies not only to the personal interests of the fellow, but also to the interests of others with whom the fellow has substantial common financial interests, including the fellow's spouse or domestic partner and dependent children.

As a condition of the fellowship, fellows may be required by the federal government to submit a financial disclosure statement and sign a declaration of adherence to policies and laws governing codes of ethical conduct. For more information about specific ethics determinations, please see the Senate Ethics Manual and the House Ethics Manual (see page 294).

RWJF does not provide individual critiques of applications submitted.

This program has a national advisory board that makes recommendations about grants to Foundation staff. RWJF will make all final grant decisions.

There are two phases in the competitive application process:

Phase 1: Preliminary Applications:

Applicants must submit a preliminary application that includes two essays and three letters of reference.

Phase 2: Full Applications:

Selected Phase 1 applicants will be invited to submit a full application accompanied by a detailed budget, budget narrative, and additional information.

To complete and submit an online preliminary application, an applicant must do the following:

- 1. Enter personal and contact information, including the names, phone numbers, and email addresses of three references who have been asked to comment on the applicant's qualifications for the program. Reference letters should address the Selection Criteria on page 4 and should be submitted electronically by 3 p.m. ET on November 3, 2024. Applicants are urged to actively track the status of the submission of required letters of reference. Please note that all reference letters should be submitted by November 3, 2024, to enable submission of the complete application package by the November 5 deadline.
- 2. Select a preliminary sponsorship track indicating the source of sponsorship. (Track 1 provide name of sponsoring institution and name of sponsoring institution's chief executive officer; or Track 2—request for stipend administration by the NAM.)
- 3. Prepare in advance the following documents. Before you begin, be sure to read the detailed instructions within the templates in the RWJF online application system.
- 4. An up-to-date curriculum vitae with dates (no more than five pages).
- 5. Two essays on the following topics:

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- a. Reflecting on your lived experience, your career, and your accomplishments, what inspires you about the possibility of becoming an RWJF Health Policy Fellow? Discuss how your personal background and experiences shaped your world view and understanding of health; the highlights of your career and the accomplishments of which you are most proud; and the factors that have motivated you to apply for the fellowship. Please include the unique perspectives you bring to the program, and what you hope to do in the future to build a better, more inclusive, healthier, and more equitable society where everyone has a fair and just opportunity to thrive, no matter who they are, where they live, or how much money they have (no more than two pages).
- b. You are serving as a health policy advisor to a member of Congress or the head of a federal agency. Prepare a memo describing a current health policy challenge and recommend an approach that the nation should take to address this challenge (no more than two pages).

Applicants who become finalists will be invited to complete a full application that will include a proposed budget of \$175,000. Track 1 applicants will also submit a letter from their sponsoring institution's chief executive officer affirming the institution's willingness to serve as an advisor to the applicant; to cultivate the fellow's growth as a health policy leader during the funding period of 12-24 months; and to administer the grant and comply with RWJF's grant reporting requirements.

- 5. RWJF does not provide individual critiques of applications submitted.
- 6. All applicants should log in to the system and familiarize themselves with the online submission requirements well before the final submission deadline. Staff may not be able to assist all applicants in the final 24 hours before the submission deadline. In fairness to all applicants, the program will not accept late submissions.

*All applications for this solicitation must be submitted via the RWJF online system. Visit www.rwjf.org/cfp/hpf16 and use the "Apply Online" link. If you have not already done so, you will be required to register at my.rwjf.org before you begin the application process.

All applicants should log in to the system and familiarize themselves with online proposal requirements well before the final submission deadline. Please note that, in the 24-hour period leading up to the application deadline, staff may not be able to assist all applicants with any system-related issues. Therefore, we encourage you to submit your application well before the deadline so that any unforeseen difficulties or technical problems may be addressed in advance.

Late submissions will not be accepted for any reason. While late submissions will not be accepted, RWJF may choose, at its sole discretion, to extend the application deadline for all applicants. Such extensions generally will be granted only in the event of (1) a verified issue with the RWJF application system that prevented completion and submission of applications; or (2) a disaster, emergency, or significant internet outage that affects one or more regions. For purposes of this policy, a region is generally considered to be one or more states. RWJF strives to give all applicants any support needed to successfully submit their application prior to the deadline. Submission is defined as all sections completed, marked "Finished," the application "submit" button used, and the application status shows "Submitted." If the deadline is extended for any reason, the extension will be posted on the funding opportunity page at www.rwjf.org. In addition, an email will be sent to all individuals that have started an application in the RWJF online system.
